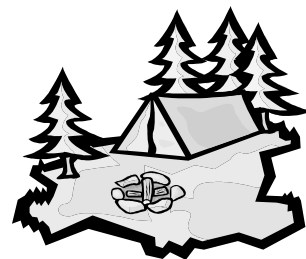

Please do not flush your holding tanks for a long period of time. Some property owners have flushed their tanks all day. PLEASE DO NOT LEAVE YOUR WATER RUNNING WHILE YOU ARE AWAY. Remember, we are on wells and septic systems; and excessive use can cause problems. We have very good wells and septic systems. Let's all help in keeping them that way.

Mosquitoes in Paradise

If you are not bothered by mosquitoes, you need read no further; unless you have an enquiring mind or nothing better to do. July through mid October are prime months for skeeters here in PVC. Why, you ask? Hot and humid weather provide ideal conditions for these pesky little buggers. High temperatures accelerate the life cycle and high humidity aids in longevity of the adults. Adult mortality is largely the result of dehydration—didn't know that, did you?

Only the females cause a significant problem—surprise, surprise! She requires a blood meal to reproduce, among other things. But, to be truthful, the male is largely innocuous and of little value except to—well, you know! We have two primary species that commonly cause us a problem (you

don't care about the scientific name, and I'm not sure how to spell them). We have the common household mosquito and the Asian Tiger mosquito. The house mosquito feeds primarily at dusk. That's the one that buzzes I your ear when you are trying to sleep if you let them in the house. The Tiger stays hungry all day and is active from dawn to dark. It is smaller with yellowish bands around a dark abdomen.

By and large, both species are simply a nuisance. Some people seem to be more attractive to mosquitoes than others, and hardly anyone is immune to an occasional bite. Both species are capable of transmitting the West Nile virus, which in some rare instances cause a serious disease. The last data I saw reported only one case of the disease so far this year in Georgia.

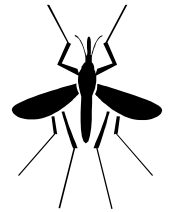
Mosquitoes require standing water to reproduce and only a

small amount is required for larvae to develop into adults. They do not survive in flowing water. It would be good for you to remove any standing water on your premises—bird baths, flower pots, bucket, etc.

Insect repellents containing DEET are highly effective. I've seen concentrations ranging from 5-40% DEET. I would advise using concentrations of 10% or less on small children. My solution is to sit in my chair on the patio, turn the fan on high and relax. You see the pesky little devils have difficulty flying in wind currents much above 5 mph.

Recipes

Jezebel Sweet Hot Sauce

Barbara Grant

- 1 18 oz. jar pineapple preserves
- 1 18 oz. jar apple jelly
- 1 5 oz. jar horseradish
- ¼ Cup dry mustard

In saucepan, combine pineapple preserves and apply jelly. Heat; stirring with a whisk until melted thoroughly. Gradually add sifted mustard, blending well. *Hint: Mustard has a tendency to glob up, so sift small amounts at a time into the hot mixture.* Remove from heat and add horseradish. Mix well. Refrigerate. Keeps in refrigerator for weeks. Good with all meats, but especially pork and chicken. Makes 4 cups. NOTE: Apricot-pineapple preserves may be used in place of plain pineapple preserves. This is also very tasty, but pineapple preserves are the best. Amount of horseradish can be varied to suit the taste.

Broccoli Slaw

- 1 16 oz. pkg. broccoli slaw
- 2 2 pkg. Chicken Ramen Soup
- 1 bunch green onions, chopped
- 1/2 Cups slivered almonds
- 1 Cup sunflower kernels

Dressing

- 1/2 Cup sugar
 - 1/2 Cup vinegar
 - 1/3 Cup oil
- Mix above with packets in noodles.

I usually use regular coleslaw for this recipe, or mix half and half. I crush the noodles while still in the pkg. This is easier and less messy. Generally, I wait till fairly close to serving to add noodles. I also browned the nuts, seeds and noodles to crisp.
