Hello, I feel I need to repeat some of the requirements for the Architectural Committee!

You need a permit from the county on items such as decks, cabins, 8X10 storage buildings etc.

We do not represent or work for the county, except they come out here and drive around and if they see something that they say needs a county permit and they discover you did not get a permit from them they can have you remove what you built. So, to forestall this I will be unable to issue a PVC permit unless you get a county permit or a waiver or a statement that you do not need their permit.

We need two members of the committee to visit your lot prior to issuing you a permit. A park permit is good for 30 days, so if your material is not coming for 2 weeks let us know up front and we can act accordingly.

Our committee members are, Bruce August, lot 200 John Maske, lot 209, and Phil Matthews lot 99.

the new pricing at the next board meeting. As for the pool, ballots have gone out to the members and the board urges all to vote "YES" to approve the proper upgrading that needs to be done and completed in the fall of 2018.

WATER & SEWER COMMITTEE:

In the last thirty days the water and sewer system have been in good working order. No identified issues are known at this time. We did prepare the ballot for installing the generators at the two wells with annual maintenance fees. Also included is a 10kw portable generator installation of connecting devices at all lift stations. This will enable the park to remain open during times of inclement weather when the park may experience a loss of power. As earlier stated, once a power loss has occurred, the water and sewer systems will become inoperable. The lift stations will quickly reach capacity and if they do overflow, the park will have to close. If that occurs, an inspection by the county health department will be required to reopen the park.

I strongly urge that we spend the required monies to enable the park to remain open during such times.

Having worked in the power generation industry for many years, please know this. Each day additional loads are placed on the nation's grid that is over 90 years in some areas and is already taxed to its limits. We see this everyday by the growth in this state. Compounding that is the fact that most of the nation's Nuclear Power Plants have reached the end of their life cycles and decommissioned, with very few new ones being built. These are only being replaced gas fired power plants that can only produce 10% of the power that nuclear power plant can. Additionally, the previous administration in Washington enacted a war on coal, so very little money was spent building new coal fired power plants or even upgrading existing ones. The lifespan of a coal fired power plant is, on average 50 years. Expect to see several decommissioned in the next five to ten years as that is part of our nation's aging infrastructure as well.

All this said, the need to spend the \$20,000 on backup power systems is all the more urgent considering the age and weakened integrity of our existing infrastructure.

FROM THE SECRETARY:

Big Changes in the Election This Year

There will be a brief election meeting on September. 1, at 10 a.m. The meeting will be suspended then until 2 p.m. at which time it will resume and the results of all four issues will be announced. Please be sure to sign back of the outside of the return envelope. There's even a reminder on every ballot! Let's embrace the change!!!


Quilting Class

Gulf Shrimp Orzo

This perfect late-summer seafood supper comes together in under an hour, using

just one dish. Gulf shrimp is the perfect seafood addition to any summer dinner dish. If you can't be at the beach enjoying seafood, this dish will be the next best thing. You'll want to sprinkle the cheesy, buttery, lemony breadcrumb topping on just about everything—and we don't blame you. Garnish with parsley and lemon wedges before serving.

Active Time 20 Mins
Total Time 40 Mins

Yield Serves 4 (serving size: 2 cups)

This perfect late-summer seafood supper comes together in under an hour. You'll want to sprinkle the ch*eesy*, buttery, lemony breadcrumbs on just about everything—and we don't blame you.

Ingredients:

3 tablespoons olive oil, divided

1 medium-size yellow onion, chopped

1 pint grape tomatoes, halved

3 garlic cloves, minced

2 teaspoons chopped fresh oregano

1 1/4 teaspoons kosher salt, divided

1/2 teaspoon black pepper, divided

3 1/4 cups chicken broth

12 ounces uncooked orzo pasta

1 pound large raw Gulf shrimp, peeled and deveined

1/2 cup panko (Japanese-style breadcrumbs)

1 ounce Parmesan cheese, grated (1/4 cup)

2 tablespoons salted butter, melted

2 teaspoons lemon zest

Torn fresh flat-leaf parsley, Lemon wedges



How to Make It Step 1

Preheat oven to 400°F with oven rack 5 to 6 inches from heat source. Heat 2 tablespoons of the oil in a large ovenproof skillet (with a lid) over mediumhigh. Add onion, and cook until translucent, about 5 minutes. Add tomatoes, garlic, oregano, 3/4 teaspoon salt, and 1/4 teaspoon pepper; cook until tomatoes are softened, about 2 minutes. Stir in broth and orzo; bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Cover and bake until orzo is tender and liquid is mostly absorbed, about 15 minutes. Remove from oven; increase temperature to broil.

Step 2

Toss shrimp with remaining 1 tablespoon oil, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and 1/4 teaspoon pepper; arrange shrimp on orzo. Combine panko, Parmesan, butter, and lemon zest; sprinkle over shrimp and orzo. Return to oven; broil, uncovered, until shrimp are opaque, 4 minutes. Garnish with parsley and lemon wedges.

Visit the waterfalls at Tallulah Gorge State

Park: Tallulah Gorge cuts a two-mile canyon into north Georgia and drops 1,000 feet to the Tallulah River. Views are easy to come by on the East and West Rim Trails at Tallulah Gorge State Park, but those extreme adventurers can hike down to the gorge floor. Permits are required as the trek involves a descent of 600 metal steps. Upon reaching the floor, the trail is a 2.5-mile loop that traverses boulders and rocks. The hike is best for experienced hikers with good-traction shoes. Your reward is that you are eye-level with the river's more popular rapids—Bridal Veil Falls and Oceana. Look up to the sky for a new perspective of the gorge from below. Cycle around Rabun Lake: Winding country roads make a ride around Lake Rabun refreshing for a city cyclist. This 38-mile loop starts and ends at Tallulah Gorge State Park, so if you plan to leave your car there, just remember you'll have to pay the \$5 parking fee. The route features many rolling hills and curves as you circle Lake Rabun and Seed Lake. Charming little houses dot the sides of the road. Around mile 16 is where the proper mountain climb begins. From there, you ascend more than 500 feet for 5 miles before coasting down winding roads for almost 4.5 miles.



Northeast Georgia is often forgotten because while it has several popular towns like

Clayton and Dillard, they are much smaller than tourist favorites like Dahlonega and Helen. However, weekend warriors can drive up Highway 23 from Atlanta and in two hours be in the heart of small mountain towns that feature hiking, mountain biking, wine tastings and great Southern meals.

Here are four of our favorites along with some must-do outdoor adventures on the trip.

Drink at Tiger Mountain Vineyards: At the very cusp of north Georgia wine country, <u>Tiger Mountain Vineyards</u> is a boutique winery that produces its own Georgia-grown wine. The tasting room is quaint, but the wine is bold. You'll find traditional dry wines made in the European-style including red blends of Cabernet and merlot, whites like the manseng and viognier, and an an award-winning semi-dry rose'.

3. Dillard, Georgia

The family-owned Dillard House serves as an excellent base of operations for outdoor activities.

Stay at the Dillard House: Most of the spots to stay in northeast Georgia consist of motels or small chains, but if you're looking to splurge on a weekend escape, the Dillard House is the place to book. The charming, family-owned lodge sits on acres of sprawling country land and even includes its own fully stocked trout pond. Gather a group of friends and rent out one of the cottages, which are available in one or two bedrooms. An added perk of staying at The Dillard House: the meals at the on-site restaurant are ol' fashioned Southern comfort food. All-you-can-eat buffets are offered for breakfast, lunch and dinner, and they are stick-to-your-ribs good.


Hike the Bartram Trail:

The Bartram Trail starts at the North

Carolina border and meanders for 37 miles through north Georgia. The high point of the trail, literally, is when it summits Rabun Bald, Georgia's second largest mountain peak at 4,696 feet. It then drops into the valley and follows the Chattooga River. For a solid day hike, you can do a 12-mile

portion from the Warwoman Road trailhead to Beegum Gap.

The hike traverses the Blue Ridge Mountains and Tennessee Valley Divide, passing through Ravens Knob, Rock Mountain, Blacks Creek Knob, Double Knob and Flat Top before reaching Rabun Bald's summit. The views here are beautiful from the CCC Fire Tower. There is a trail access point 0.8 miles after the descent at Beegum Gap.



The decision was made to post these every month for you and new members to refer to. So keep them on your refrigerator for future reference.

RIGHT-OF-WAY: Motor vehicles and RVs have the RIGHT-OF-WAY over golf carts. It's much easier for a golf cart to move off the narrow roads than a larger vehicle!

GARBAGE: The Dumpsters (by the mailboxes) are for Household Waste Only. Break down all boxes flat that are to be placed in the dumpsters. Garbage pickup is Tuesdays and Fridays.

Items other than household waste; chairs, tables, small appliances, flower pots, old wood, etc. need to be taken to the **Roll Off** dumpster located down by the trailer storage area. If the gate is locked, this means the roll-off is full. Please do not leave items around the roll-off or at the gate. Hold on to them, check with Darrell (Grounds) to find out when it will be emptied, and place it in the roll-off at that time.

Be aware of where you put your garbage bags! People have put them on top of their cars and driven away and forgotten them, only to have them fall off over the park roads or on Paradise Valley Road.

Items have been found in the roll-off that are in perfect condition. The Community Thrift Store is located on 1160 E Kytle St (Rte. 115) in Cleveland, and they accept most things in good condition and they donate some of the profits to local charities. Give them a call if you have any questions tel: 706-865-0574. And PLEASE... do not leave items outside the roll-off. Can't get your item into the roll -off? Ask for help!!

WATER CODES: Have you noticed the numbers and letters on the gate and have no idea what these mean? Paradise has a code

system in the park for water and sewer issues. The explanation to this is: the number "1" represents side one in the park. This encompasses lots 1 through 194, which are all on the entrance side of the park. The number "2" represents side two of the park. Which encompasses lots 195 thru 290, which are all the lots over the bridge. The letter "B" represents that a "Boil Notice" is in effect. This means, if posted on the gate, that all lots affected by a water problem must boil their water prior to use. Notices are posted by the mailboxes, on the bridge board and at the laundry room. Also, an e-Blast with this information is sent out to all residents who are registered on the PVCOA.com website. If you have not registered on the website, you will NOT receive this information via your email.



CONSERVING PARK EXPENSES:

Please remember to turn off the lights in the pavilion, rest rooms, laundry, and to close down the umbrellas at

the pool and put them in the ladies' and men's room. This will extend their life for future years. Straighten chairs in the pavilion, breezeway, pool...in other words treat the park like you would your own home, because it is! Remember, the expenses incurred to repair, replace or fix these issues come from your pocket!

GEORGIA DNR (Department of Natural Resources) prohibits any and all changes

made to the creeks and streams. Trees or vegetation cannot be removed from the side of the creek. Clearing can only be done up to the top of the bank. This means that moving rocks or natural vegetation and dumping debris of any kind into the waterways are illegal. Please be aware the county has in the past issued fines for these violations.

SUGGESTIONS

DELIVERIES:

Waiting for a package to arrive and have no idea where it will

be delivered? Check the sales office (the building on the right side at the entrance with the mailbox in front). It was formerly the real-estate sales office. It is now where packages are delivered from UPS and FedEx. So, stop in periodically to see if your package arrived safely. One important thing...please check the label to be sure the package belongs to you. Other members' packages are being picked up in error, thinking they have the correct one.



AMERICAN FLAGS are to be burned in ceremony! Don't know how? Hang on to them, ask a board member what procedure to

follow. Perhaps they can be collected and burned in a ceremony at one time!



BOOK & MOVIE DONATIONS:

Anyone who has been to the laundry has seen the numerous books, games

and tapes/CDs that surround the walls. All these items have been generously donated by members of PVC. They are there to borrow and return afterwards for others to appreciate. Please feel free to donate the above items for others to continue to enjoy throughout the years!

WATER SHUT OFF: When leaving the Campground



for more than 48 hours, it is imperative to shut your water off at the main valve in order to prevent damage to your property and to protect the

overall water system in the campground.



SEPTIC: Please be very mindful of what you put into the septic system. It is important that you remember not to pour

grease down your drains. Feminine products, wipes, non-biodegradable waste should not be flushed down the toilets. This has caused MAJOR problems in the past that resulted in expensive repairs.

Roger is not the campground manager, he is the parks work camper. His responsibilities come from a member of the board, NOT an individual owner

in the park! If you have an issue or suggestion that needs attention, please contact a board member and they will handle the issue.

PETS: Those of us who have them know only too well how special they are to us. But not everyone



feels the same way, so PLEASE be considerate to all! No pets are allowed in the pool area or the pavilion. Be sure to

carry plastic bags when walking your dog to clean up after them. No dog enclosures, whether temporary or permanent, are allowed to be put up in the park.

MOTORCYCLES are not permitted to ride around the park like a golf cart. They are allowed egress and ingress only.



911 EMERGENCY CALLS: When calling 911 from a cell phone, you must specify White County! If you don't, you could lose much-needed minutes as your call will go to Lumpkin or Habersham County, and

they transfer your information to White County. Be safe and remember, White County! When at the pool or pavilion, please note there is a phone outside the laundry room door for emergency use.



WI FI SERVICE: For those of you who do not have Internet access available at your cabin or trailer, it is

available to you. Come, relax and get your emails at the pavilion. Sign into free Internet service. The code and password are as follows:

WI FI Network: Win_5d4e, WI FI Password: z9huuksg

QUIET TIME: Quiet time is 11 p.m. to 8 a.m. Using motorized equipment or creating loud noises is prohibited between these hours.



POST OFFICE: If you do not have a mailbox, your mail cannot be left at the PVC mailbox area.

Arrangements must be made with the Cleveland Post Office to manage the handling of your mail.

DO NOT Let anyone through the gate who you don't know!! It's for everyone's safety!!



Board Members The board members are volunteers who devote their time and effort to keeping PVC what it is... "the best RV park in Cleveland." Please be mindful of this when you get upset that something is not being taken care of, i.e. American flags being put in the dumpster, the blueberry bushes and common grounds not being maintained, dog droppings not being picked up. REMEMBER...this is YOUR park, too. It's up to ALL owners to do their part so this park is maintained.

So PLEASE, if you see something happening that isn't right, say something, in a nice way. Some people may not realize or know the rules. Take part and act, not complain. BOD hours are 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday - Friday, unless the owner is a weekender. Be considerate, call before going to their lot! They're here to enjoy Paradise also!

LAUNDRY ROOM ETIQUETTE

Do:

Don't:

- Be timely in removing clothes from washers and dryers.
- Give others 15-20 minutes of leeway after their cycle has finished before removing their clothes from the machine.
- Place other people's finished clothes either in a laundry basket or on top of the machine after giving appropriate leeway.
- Keep the laundry room neat and tidy.
- (1) Clean up all spills and messes.
- Empty the lint tray when done using the drver.
- Return all clothing left behind to its owner.
- Be respectful of others people's clothing.

- Leave clothes in the washer or dryer after the cycle has finished.
- Throw other people's clothing onto the floor when removing it from machine.
- Be greedy with machines. Always share machines and leave at least one machine free for others to use.
- Overload machines with clothing or use too much detergent.
- Leave clothing or laundry baskets in the middle of the floor in the way of others.
- Make someone else clean up after you.
- Leave behind any clothing in the machines.

And PLEASE do not wash or dry pet beds in the machines. Have consideration for others in Paradise!
