WATER & SEWER COMMITTEE:

All is well with the water and sewer system at this time, with no system maintenance expenditures for the past month.

With regards to the proposed generator backup additions that were proposed at the owners and BOD meetings, we have proposals for installed generators and propane tanks at both wells and the proposal for installing the electrical devices at all lift stations, with a portable generator and cord set for connection to the stations.

What we are waiting on is the quote for annual maintenance of the stationary generators. Understand that the stationary generators will require different maintenance schedules over a five year period. The plan is to amortize this in the estimate, but actual will be paid for services rendered at the time.



For the proposal of tying the two water systems together, Freeman Electric/American Water is attempting to gather the old data from the previous three times we have approached them for this task and update the quote. More to come on this item.

We are requesting a quote from a local supplier to install a door in the back wall of well house #1 to remove the three out of service well tanks and possibly use that area for additional storage space.

MAJOR ELECTION NEWS!!!

This year when you receive your election materials in the mail, there will be THREE ballots in the envelope: The Board of Directors ballot, the proposed water expenditure ballot and the proposed Declaration of Covenants changes ballot. The proposed water expenditure vote was postponed so Jeff could collect and evaluate the information requested at the last board meeting. Each of the ballots will be printed on different

colored paper to catch your eye to assure you return them all. Your stamped return envelope will have your return address on it as well as your lot number. Please be sure to use that envelope to return your ballots. Owners of multiple lots will receive one envelope containing the THREE ballots for EACH of their lots. The return envelopes will have the different lot numbers on them.

The notice of the Election Meeting on Saturday, September 1, must be mailed, according to the Covenants. It will be mailed to your "Seasonal Address" of record that you chose on your 2018 information sheet. The directions on how to complete the ballots, the THREE ballots, and the bios of the candidates will be included in that envelope. Please be sure to follow the directions carefully so that your votes are counted. Every year a few ballots are unable to be counted because the member either did not mark their choice on the ballot, marked too many choices, or did not sign their vote. Please complete your ballots carefully and follow the directions accompanying the mailing.

On September 1, the Election Meeting will convene at 10 a.m. That meeting will be brief and will recess for the counting of ballots. The votes for all three issues will then be counted. There will be separate counting teams for each of the types of ballots. This will occupy most of the space in the pavilion and breezeway and will require quiet so the counters may concentrate. At 2:00 p.m. the meeting will reconvene for the results of the board election, the water project and the proposed covenant changes. This meeting format is a change from the way it has been done recently, but the same way it was done before that. After that meeting, the newly elected board members will join the continuing board members for 2019 for a meeting to discuss positions on the board.

If you have any questions, please call or stop by so I can clear up any confusion.

college into the dynamic institution it is today.



Gold Mining History

With these dog days of summer upon us (no pun intended) I thought an article regarding pets and

instructions with a new puppy would be appropriate. Beside the list below on how to keep your beloved pet healthy and happy the one issue I would like to stress and that I have seen a little too often is locking your pet in a car in the middle of summer or ANYTIME for that matter! I have rescued several animals myself because of mindless people. So, PLEASE...don't take

your pet in the car with you unless you intend to share the day with them outside of the vehicle!

Blue Ridge Pet Center—10 Best Training tips for a new Puppy

Ok, he's finally home. Training needs to begin immediately, considering the new pattern on the rug, not to mention the dog's breakfast he's made of your new strappy sandals. But where should you start? Whether you train your new puppy or dog yourself, take classes, or hire a private trainer, some basic training tips should be tackled right out of the gate.

These top 10 tips from professional dog trainers at the top of their game will help get you going.

Aside: When your puppy is old enough, think about getting him or her neutered or spayed, likewise if you adopt a dog. A neutered or spayed dog is more docile, less aggressive, and may be more open to successful training.

Top 10 training tips

1. Choose your dog's name wisely and be respectful of it. Of course you'll want to pick a name for your new puppy or dog that you love, but for the purposes of training, it also helps to consider a short name ending with a strong consonant.

This allows you to say his name so that he can always hear it clearly. A strong ending (i.e. Jasper, Jack, Ginger) perks up puppy ears - especially when you place a strong emphasize at the end. If he's an older dog, he's probably used to his name; however, changing it isn't out of the question. If he's from a shelter, they may neglect to tell you that he has a temporary name assigned to him by staff. If he's from a breeder, he'll come to you with a long name, which you may want to shorten or change, and if he's coming out of an abusive situation, a new name may represent a fresh start. But we're lucky: dogs are extremely adaptable. And soon enough, if you use it consistently, he will respond to his new name. New name or old, as much as possible, associate it with pleasant, fun things, rather than negative. The goal is for him to think of his name the same way he thinks of other great stuff in his life, like "walk," "cookie," or "dinner!".

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Puppy info continued:

2. Decide on the "house rules."

Before he comes home, decide what he can and can't do. Is he allowed on the bed or the furniture? Are parts of the house off limits? Will he have his own chair at your dining table? If the rules are settled on early, you can avoid confusion for both of you.

3. Set up his private den.

He needs "a room of his own." From the earliest possible moment give your pup or dog his own, private sleeping place that's not used by anyone else in the family, or another pet. He'll benefit from short periods left alone in the comfort and safety of his den. Reward him if he remains relaxed and quiet. His den, which is often a crate, will also be a valuable tool for housetraining.

4. Help him relax when he comes home.

When your puppy gets home, give him a warm hot water bottle and put a ticking clock near his sleeping area. This imitates the heat and heartbeat of his litter mates and will soothe him in his new environment. This may be even more important for a new dog from a busy, loud shelter who's had a rough time early on. Whatever you can do to help him get comfortable in his new home will be good for both of you.

5. Teach him to come when called.

Come Jasper! Good boy! Teaching him to come is the command to be mastered first and foremost. And since he'll be coming to you, your alpha status will be reinforced. Get on his level and tell him to come using his name. When he does, make a big deal using positive reinforcement. Then try it when he's busy with something interesting. You'll really see the benefits of perfecting this command early as he gets older.

6. Reward his good behavior.

Reward your puppy or dog's good behavior with positive reinforcement. Use treats, toys, love, or heaps of praise. Let him know when's he's getting it

right. Likewise, never reward bad behavior; it'll only confuse him.

7. Take care of the jump up.

Puppies love to jump up in greeting. Don't reprimand him, just ignore his behavior and wait 'til he settles down before giving positive reinforcement. Never encourage jumping behavior by patting or praising your dog when he's in a "jumping up" position. Turn your back on him and pay him no attention.

8. Teach him on "dog time."

Puppies and dogs live in the moment. Two minutes after they've done something, it's forgotten about. When he's doing something bad, try your chosen training technique right away so he has a chance to make the association between the behavior and the correction. Consistent repetition will reinforce what's he's learned.

9. Discourage him from biting or nipping. Instead of scolding him, a great way to put off your mouthy canine is to pretend that you're in great pain when he's biting or nipping you. He'll be so surprised he's likely to stop immediately. If this doesn't work, try trading a chew toy for your hand or pant leg. The swap trick also works when he's into your favorite shoes. He'll prefer a toy or bone anyway. If all else fails, break up the biting behavior, and then just ignore him.

10. End training sessions on a positive note. Excellent boy! Good job, Jasper! He's worked hard to please you throughout the training. Leave him with lots of praise, a treat, some petting, or five minutes of play. This guarantees he'll show up at his next class with his tail wagging - ready to work! 1 tablespoon poppy seeds

1 head iceberg lettuce, torn into bite-size pieces

1 bunch fresh spinach, washed, stems removed

1/2 cup diced red onion

1 (16 ounce) package fresh strawberries, hulled and sliced

Directions:

Make a dressing by whisking together the mayonnaise, sugar, and vinegar in a small bowl. Stir in the poppy seeds; set aside.

Toss together the lettuce, spinach, and onion in a large bowl. Drizzle the dressing over the salad and toss to coat. Add the strawberries and lightly toss again. Serve immediately.

Add a little protein: grilled shrimp, marinated chicken or leftover London broil. A sprinkle of feta or gorgonzola cheese is also a nice addition.

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RECEIPE OF THE MONTH



Strawberry Summer Salad

Prep:20 m Ready In 20 m

Ingredients

1 cup mayonnaise1/4 cup white sugar1 tablespoon white vinegar





RIGHT-OF-WAY: Motor vehicles and RVs have the RIGHT-OF-WAY over golf carts. It's much easier for a golf cart to move off the narrow roads than a larger vehicle!

GARBAGE: The Dumpsters (by the mailboxes) are for Household Waste Only. Break down all boxes flat that are to be placed in the dumpsters. Garbage pickup is Tuesdays and Fridays.

Items other than household waste; chairs, tables, small appliances, flower pots, old wood, etc. need to be taken to the **Roll Off** dumpster located down by the trailer storage area. If the gate is locked, this means the roll-off is full. Please do not leave items around the roll-off or at the gate. Hold on to them, check with Darrell (Grounds) to find out when it will be emptied, and place it in the roll-off at that time.

Be aware of where you put your garbage bags! People have put them on top of their cars and driven away and forgotten them, only to have them fall off over the park roads or on Paradise Valley Road.

Items have been found in the roll-off that are in perfect condition. The Community Thrift Store is located on 1160 E Kytle St (Rte. 115) in Cleveland, and they accept most things in good condition and they donate some of the profits to local charities. Give them a call if you have any questions tel: 706-865-0574. And PLEASE... do not leave items outside the roll-off. Can't get your item into the roll off? Ask for help!!

WATER CODES: Have you noticed the numbers and letters on the gate and have no idea what these mean? Paradise has a code

system in the park for water and sewer issues. The explanation to this is: the number "1" represents side one in the park. This encompasses lots 1 through 194, which are all on the entrance side of the park. The number "2" represents side two of the park. Which encompasses lots 195 thru 290, which are all the lots over the bridge. The letter "B" represents that a "Boil Notice" is in effect. This means, if posted on the gate, that all lots affected by a water problem must boil their water prior to use. Notices are posted by the mailboxes, on the bridge board and at the laundry room. Also, an e-Blast with this information is sent out to all residents who are registered on the PVCOA.com website. If you have not registered on the website, you will NOT receive this information via your email.



CONSERVING PARK EXPENSES:

Please remember to turn off the lights in the pavilion, rest rooms, laundry, and to close down the umbrellas at

the pool and put them in the ladies' and men's room. This will extend their life for future years. Straighten chairs in the pavilion, breezeway, pool...in other words treat the park like you would your own home, because it is! Remember, the expenses incurred to repair, replace or fix these issues come from your pocket!

GEORGIA DNR (Department of Natural Resources) prohibits any and all changes

made to the creeks and streams. Trees or vegetation cannot be removed from the side of the creek. Clearing can only be done up to the top of the bank. This means that moving rocks or natural vegetation and dumping debris of any kind into the waterways are illegal. Please be aware the county has in the past issued fines for these violations.

DELIVERIES:

Waiting for a package to arrive and have no idea where it will be delivered? Check the sales office (the building on the right side at the entrance with the mailbox in front). It was formerly the real-estate sales office. It is now where packages are delivered from UPS and FedEx. So, stop in periodically to see if your package arrived safely. One important thing...please check the label to be sure the package belongs to you. Other members' packages are being picked up in error, thinking they have the correct one.



AMERICAN FLAGS are to be burned in ceremony! Don't know how? Hang on to them, ask a board member what procedure to

follow. Perhaps they can be collected and burned in a ceremony at one time!



BOOK & MOVIE DONATIONS:

water shut off: When leaving the Campground for more than 48 hours, it is imperative to shut your

water off at the main valve in order to prevent damage to your property and to protect the overall water system in the campground.



SEPTIC: Please be very mindful of what you put into the septic system. It is important that you remember not to

pour grease down your drains. Feminine products, wipes, non-biodegradable waste should not be flushed down the toilets. This has caused MAJOR problems in the past that resulted in expensive repairs.

Roger is not the campground manager, he is our work camper. His responsibilities come from a member of the board, NOT an individual owner

in the park! If you have an issue or suggestion that needs attention, please contact a board member and they will handle the issue.



PETS: Those of us who have them know only too well how special they are to us. But not everyone feels the same way, so PLEASE be considerate to

all! No pets are allowed in the pool area or the pavilion. Be sure to carry plastic bags when

walking your dog to clean up after them. No dog enclosures, whether temporary or permanent, are allowed to be put up in the park.

MOTORCYCLES are not permitted to ride around the park like a golf cart. They are only allowed egress and ingress. Please comply with this rule.

911 EMERGENCY CALLS: When calling 911 from a **EMERGENCY** cell phone, you must specify

White County! If you don't, you could lose much-needed minutes as your call will go to Lumpkin or Habersham County, and they

transfer your information to White County. Be safe and remember, White County! When at the pool or pavilion, please note there is a phone outside the laundry room door for emergency use.



WI FI SERVICE: For those of you who do not have Internet access available at your cabin or trailer, it is

available to you. Come, relax and get your emails at the pavilion. Sign into free Internet service. The code and password are as follows:

QUIET TIME: Quiet time is 11 p.m. to 8 a.m. Using motorized equipment or creating loud noises is prohibited

between these hours.



POST OFFICE: If you do not have a mailbox, your mail cannot be left at the PVC mailbox area.

Arrangements must be made with the Cleveland Post Office to manage the handling of your mail.
