FOR YOUR INFORMATION

White County is celebrating 150 years and here is more history about the county that we live in.

The White County jail was built in 1858. The notorious horse thief, Sunny Nash, was known to have been jailed there. Old jail records indicate that he escaped after the sheriff had gone home for the evening!

The original structure was condemned in 1897, and work began on the building which stands today. The brick jail was completed in 1901 while Sheriff William Jackson was in office. The first floor was designed to house the jailer and his family. Horse thieves, hooligans, and lawbreakers, up to thirty at a time, were housed on the second floor. Some prisoners carved their names on the walls, which goes down in history as proof that they were there.

In 1964, the new courthouse and jail, which are in use today, were completed. The old jailhouse, with its intriguing history, was renovated by the Chamber of Commerce and Development Authority. This is where the Chamber of Commerce is located.

RECIPE FOR THE MONTH

Chocolate Peanut Squares

cup of butter, divided
 squares (1 ounce each) semisweet chocolate, divided
 1½ cups graham cracker crumbs
 2 cup unsalted dry roasted peanuts, chopped
 packages (8 ounces each) cream cheese, softened
 cup sugar
 teaspoon vanilla extract

l. In a small bowl, melt ³/₄ cup butter and two squares of chocolate in the microwave; stir until smooth. Stir in cracker crumbs and peanuts.

2. Press into a greased 13x9 in. pan. Cover and refrigerate for 30 minutes or until set.

3. In a small mixing bowl, beat the cream cheese, sugar and vanilla until fluffy. Spread over chocolate layer. Melt the remaining butter and chocolate; stir until smooth. Carefully spread over cream cheese layer. Cover and refrigerate until set. Cut into squares. Yield: 2 dozen. Enjoy!

LITTLE TID BITS

Use vertical strokes when washing windows outside and horizontal for inside windows, this way you can tell which side has the streaks. Don't wash windows on a sunny day. They will dry too quickly and will probably streak.

Wrap celery in aluminum foil when putting in the refrigerator and it will keep for weeks.

Spray your Tupperware containers with nonstick cooking spray before pouring in tomato based sauces and there won't be any stains.

Don't throw out all that leftover wine: Freeze into ice cubes for future use in casseroles and sauces. (Left over wine? What's that?!)

To get rid of itch from mosquito bites, apply soap on the area and you will experience instant relief.
