

If leaving for the off season, please turn your water off and winterize your camper, park model or cabin to prevent water line breakage from freezing. Have safe travels and good health until you return to Paradise Valley Campground and I look forward to seeing all of you next season!

WATER & SEWER COMMITTEE:



Where did summer go? Seems like everyone was just returning to the park a few days ago and now fall is upon us. North Georgia Environmental is scheduled to replace the two remaining lift stations on

side two the week of September 19. The new systems should serve the park well for years to come. Soon I will be asking the Board for recommendations as to how to number the septic systems and lift stations throughout the park.

Water & Sewer continued...

We will also be renumbering these systems so they are more in order and easier to find. The present system skips and jumps pretty much like the lot numbering system in the park.

Just a quick word regarding the lids to our septic tanks.

Occasionally we are discovering broken lids or lids that cannot be tightened down securely with the regular screws. People step on them, lawn mowers hit them and some fail as they have been taken off and put back on many time through the years. As we find a bad lid we ask North Georgia Environmental to repair them if possible and if not repairable we ask that they be replaced. So, if you should notice a persistent odor in any area, please call and let me know. We will track down the problem and deal with it.

We had a minor issue with one of the filters in Well House One recently. A valve malfunctioned and allowed water to flow through to the flush pipe that empties beside Paradise Valley Road. A call to American Water and the problem was quickly solved. Otherwise, both water systems seem to be running as they should. Just another reminder that you should check your main cut off valve to your lot to make sure it is working freely and correctly. We have replaced several valves in the last few weeks as these valves are reaching the end of their service life, handles are breaking off and some will not close down all the way.

Best wishes to you and your family as you enjoy the remainder of the 2016 season!

RECIPE OF THE MONTH



Beef Stew VI

Ingredients:

- 2 lbs. of stew meat
- 3 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 4 cubes beef bouillon, crumbled
- 1 teaspoon dried rosemary
- 1 teaspoon dried parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 3 large potatoes, peeled and cubed
- 4 carrots, cut into 1 inch pieces
- 4 stalks celery, cut into 1 inch pieces
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2 teaspoons corn starch
- 2 teaspoons cold water

Directions:

- 1. In large pot or Dutch oven cook beef in oil over med heat until brown, dissolve bouillon in water and pour into pot. Stir in rosemary, parsley and pepper. Bring to a boil then reduce heat, cover and simmer 1 hour.
- 2. Stir potatoes, carrots, celery and onion into the pot. Dissolve corn starch in water and stir into stew. Cover and simmer 1 hour more.

Southwest Corn Pudding

Ingredients:

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 medium onion, halved and thinly sliced
- 1 1/2 cups fresh corn kernels (3 ears), or thawed frozen whole kernel corn
- 1/2 cup chopped red sweet pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/4 cup cornmeal
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 14 1/2 ounce can cream-style corn
- 4 eggs, lightly beaten
- 14 ounce can diced green chiles, undrained
- 1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese (4 ounces) 1 tablespoon butter

Directions:

- 1. Heat oil and 1 tablespoon butter in a 9- or 10-inch cast-iron or other heavy oven-going skillet over medium-high heat. When butter is melted and begins to bubble, add onion. Cook for 5 minutes or until onion is soft and beginning to brown, stirring occasionally. Add corn kernels, sweet pepper and cumin. Cook and stir for 3 minutes more. Remove skillet from heat to cool slightly.
- 2. Meanwhile, in a medium bowl, combine cornmeal, flour, and salt. Add cream-style corn, eggs, undrained chilies and cheese; stir just until combined.
- 3. Fold onion mixture into cornmeal mixture. Return skillet to medium heat and add 1 tablespoon butter. When butter is melted, tilt skillet to coat bottom with butter. Pour batter into skillet.

Transfer skillet to a 350 degrees F oven and bake for 30 to 35 minutes or until a knife inserted near the center comes out clean. Serve warm.

Water Codes


Have you noticed the numbers and letters on the gate and have no idea what these mean?

We have a code system in the park for water and sewer issues. The explanation to this is: the number "1" represents **side one** in the park. This encompasses lots 1 thru 194, which are all on the entrance side of the park.

The number "2" represents **side two** of the park. Which encompasses lots 195 thru 290, which are all the lots over the bridge.

The letter "B" represents a **Boil Notice** is in effect. This means, if posted on the gate, that all lots affected by a water problem must boil their water prior to use.

Notices are posted by the mailboxes, on the bridge board and at the laundry room Also, an eBlast with this information is sent out to all residents who are registered on the PVCOA.com website. If you have not registered on the website, you will NOT receive this information via your email.



With the request for articles for the Pipeline from members of the park, Mr. Peavy was right on time last year with this very important article. So I felt once more the need to post it again this year, to help those

STEP BY STEP RV/CABIN WINTERIZING CHECKLIST



That all too familiar time of the year is here again. Leaves are falling from the trees, and the grass is dormant. The summer flowers are gone. The days are shorter and the nights are colder. Fall is upon us. Fall is my favor-

ite time of the year. After a hot North Georgia summer, I look forward to this time of year. It has its good and bad points. It's good that I don't have to cut the grass for several months. It's bad that we have to close the pool for several months. It's good that I don't have to run the air conditioning, but bad that we will soon have to turn the furnace on.

Fall is also the time of year you need to decide if your camping season is over. Parking your RV for the winter requires some preventive measures so it will be ready to use next spring. You'll also be glad you did it when you don't have costly repair bills due to the damaging results of winter. Now the question is how do you prepare it for winter, and who will be doing it? If you're like me and you enjoy performing the routine maintenance on your RV, not to mention saving a few dollars, the "who" part is answered. As for the "how" part, this checklist is the same one I used to make our Winterizing & Storing video. I feel it is the easiest and most effective way to winterize your RV.

Before you get started there are a few items you will need to have. These items can be found in most RV parts stores:

- * Non-toxic RV antifreeze (The amount depends on the layout and length of your plumbing lines. Two to three gallons will normally do).
- * A water heater by-pass kit, if not already installed.
- * A wand to clean out holding tanks.

To Do.....

- Drain and flush the gray and black holding tanks. If your RV doesn't have a built in tank flushing system, clean the black tank out with a wand or use a product like Flush King that allows you to clean both the black and gray tanks. Lubricate the termination valves with WD 40.
- * Drain the water heater. Remove the drain plug and open the pressure relief valve. CAUTION: never drain the water heater when it is hot or under pressure.
- * Open all hot and cold faucets; don't forget the toilet valve and outside shower.
- * Locate and open the low point drain lines.

 There will be one for the hot and cold water lines.
- * Using the water pump will help force water out, but turn it off as soon as the system is drained.
- * Recap all drains and close all faucets.
- * By-pass the water heater. If you do not have a by-Pass kit installed the water heater will fill up with anti-freeze before it goes through the water lines, wasting six gallons of antifreeze.
- * Install a water pump converter kit, or disconnect the inlet side of the water pump (the line coming from the fresh water holding tank). Connect a piece of clear tubing to the inlet side of the pump and put the other end into a one gallon container of nontoxic RV antifreeze.
- * Turn the water pump on and pressurize the system.
- * Starting with the closest faucet, slowly open the hot and then cold valves until antifreeze appears. Re place the antifreeze container as required.
- Repeat this process on all faucets from the closest to the farthest away. Don't forget the outside shower, if equipped.
- * Open the valve with a small screwdriver until you see antifreeze. Replace the screen.
- * Flush the toilet until antifreeze appears.
- * Turn the water pump off and open a faucet to release the pressure. Go outside to the city water inlet.
- * Remove the small screen over the inlet and push in on
- * Pour a cupful of antifreeze down each drain. Pour a couple of cups in the toilet and flush into the hold-

- ing tank.
- * If your water heater has an electric heating element make sure it is turned off. This will protect the element if the unit is plugged in while being stored.
- * Make sure all the faucets are closed.
- * Consult your owner manuals for winterizing icemakers and washing machines.
- * The unit is winterized.

This checklist is a basic guide that was intended to assist you in winterizing your RV. As with many other checklists it would be impossible to cover every RV. It is extremely important that you read your owner's manuals for unit-specific winterizing guidelines.
