President's Corner

I have two things I would like to talk about.

First is the Bears. We need to take in all types of bird feeders at night. We were told by the DNR that they will draw bears. I would like to thank the people who cleaned up the pears at the roll-off. I understand why they were put there. But deer do not eat pears or apples on the ground because of bees.

The second thing is full-time owners. This is a growing problem over the last few years. We have 29 caretakers who help to look after the park during the winter. Of these people only about 9 are full-timers. We also have about 15 members who are not caretakers but live here full-time. If we don't do something about this, a couple of things could happen. Our sewer system could go out as it is not made to support this many people year round. If this happens, the EPA would shut the park down until the problem is corrected. Second, our classification could be changed and our taxes increased. After the new Board is elected, this Board will get with them to come up with a way to enforce the covenant, which states this park is not for year-round living. I am not trying to scare you but to let you know what is going on in the park. If you have any questions, please come to the September 8th Board meeting. We will be glad to answer your questions.

Greetings,

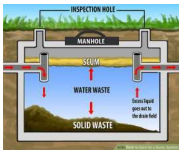

GROUNDS:

The rip-rap has been completed down by the trailer spaces. This was done to preserve the land being washed away by heavy rains. Six trees need to come down in the park. Bob's Tree Service will be scheduled to come in to take care of this situation in the near future. The results of Saturday's vote will determine the pool being closed for repairs. Notification will be sent prior to all work being started. Fall is coming up real soon...Please keep the ditches in and around your property free from leaves and debris. This is every owner's responsibility! Other than these few issues, all is well in the grounds department.



WATER & SEWER COMMITTEE:

We are investigating the possibility of an excess of iron on side 1. It has been reported that an odor and a rust color is in the water, which is repairable. Further reports will be issued when it becomes available. The water is safe for consumption.

Repairs have been made this month and the annual sludge test will be done in September. Please remember that the only thing to go into the system is septic approved toilet paper, no wipes, diapers or feminine products. Other than the above normal septic protocol, all is well with the systems. We have septic system do's & don'ts magnets if you would like to post it on your fridge for reference. Just ask a board member for one. A break in the line and water leak located between the laundry room and sales office has been addressed and repaired.

Last but not least, I would like to thank Ro Soucy for creating a master valve/septic/lift station list to help with the location of all these important things. He also replaced the old tags that were falling off.

LEAF & LIMB PICK UP:

Clyde and Darrell have been talking to Perry about yard waste pickup. The biggest problem is people throwing away household garbage and inappropriate materials with yard waste. This week when he was here, there was a bag set out for him to pick up that was full of dumpster trash. That's causing the problem with him. Perry signed his new contract to pick up leaves and limbs for another year. In the contract it was agreed that if there is anything other than leaves in a bag, it will be sprayed with white paint. The board will then get with the owner and take care of the situation. So PLEASE do not put anything in your yard waste bags other than leaves or grass clippings. Limbs, sticks & branches must be bundled and tied in 4 foot lengths and left at the front of your property. Perry takes these bags and burns the contents and household garbage causes problems. So please be considerate and do not compromise PVC's contract with Perry.



RECIPE OF THE MONTH



Cranberry Apple Stuffed Pork Loin

Chilling the pork roast before cutting will make the roast easier to cut.

- Prep time: 25 minutes
- Cook time: 1 hour
- Yield: Serves 6 to 8

Ingredients

- 1 boneless pork loin (about 3 to 4 pounds)
- Sea salt and freshly ground pepper
- 1/2 cup panko or homemade breadcrumbs
- 1/2 cup chicken stock
- 1 cup peeled, chopped tart green apples
- 1/3 cup dried cranberries
- 1/3 cup chopped walnuts, toasted
- 1/4 cup minced shallots
- 2 Tbsp pure maple syrup
- 1 teaspoon minced rosemary

Special equipment: [Kitchen string](#)

Method

1. Preheat oven to 450°F.
2. How to butterfly the pork loin: Place the pork loin roast fat side down on a cutting board. Note that one long side of the pork loin roast will be thicker, and one side thinner. Using a sharp knife, make a long cut an inch or so from the edge from the thinner long side of the roast at about a 45° degree angle, stopping a half inch from reaching the bottom of the roast. Then angle the knife so that it is flat, parallel to the cutting board, and make slow, shallow cuts into the roast, along the same line. As you cut, you can open up the top part of the roast like a book. Keep making slow, even cuts until you have "rolled" the roast out completely.
3. Pound the butterflied roast to an even thickness: With the pork roast unfolded, cover with 2 layers of plastic wrap. Pound with a meat mallet to flatten to a somewhat even

thickness. Remove plastic wrap. Sprinkle the pork with salt and pepper and set aside.

4. Make the filling: Place the panko and stock in a small bowl and stir to combine. Stir in the apples, walnuts, cranberries, shallots, maple syrup and rosemary.
5. Roll up pork roast with filling: Spread the filling over surface of the pork, leaving an inch margin around all sides except for the fat layer side—with that side leave a 2-inch margin. Starting with the end of the roast rectangle that does not have the fat layer on the bottom, roll up the roast.
6. Secure with kitchen string. Tie the roast in 1 to 2 inch intervals with cotton kitchen string.
At this point you can wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate if you are making ahead.
7. Bake: Coat the bottom of a roasting pan with cooking spray or a little olive oil. Place the roast in the pan and cook at 450°F for 15 minutes to brown the top, then reduce the oven temperature to 325°F. Cook uncovered, for about 30 to 40 minutes, or until the pork reaches an internal temperature of 140°F.
8. Rest and serve: Tent the roast with foil and let it rest for 10 minutes. Remove the kitchen string and slice into 1/2-inch thick slices to serve. Save the pan drippings! Serve with pan drippings or use the pan drippings to make gravy.

Pumpkin Roll

An easy pumpkin roll dessert that tastes great.

Ingredients

- 3 eggs, beaten
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 2/3 cup pumpkin puree
- 3/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 tablespoons butter, softened
- 8 ounces cream cheese
- 1 cup confectioners sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
- confectioners sugar for dusting



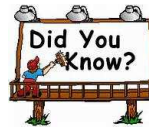

Directions

1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F (190 degrees C).
Butter or grease one 10x15 inch jelly roll pan.
2. In a mixing bowl, blend together the eggs, sugar, cinnamon, and pumpkin. In a separate bowl, mix together flour and baking soda. Add to pumpkin mixture and blend until smooth. Evenly spread the mixture over the prepared jelly roll pan.
3. Bake 15 to 25 minutes in the preheated oven. Remove from oven and allow to cool enough to handle.
4. Remove cake from pan and place on tea towel (cotton, not terry cloth). Roll up the cake by Rolling a towel inside cake and place seam side down to cool.
5. Prepare the frosting by blending together the butter, cream cheese, confectioners sugar, and vanilla.

When cake is completely cooled, unroll and spread with cream cheese filling. Roll up again without towel. Wrap with plastic wrap and refrigerate until ready to serve. Sprinkle top with confectioners sugar and slice into 8-10 servings.

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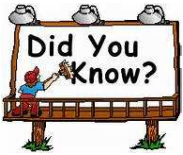

General Park Information



911 EMERGENCY CALLS: When calling 911 from a cell phone, you must specify **White County!** If you don't, you could lose much-needed time as your call will go to Lumpkin or Habersham County, and they transfer your information to White County. Be safe and remember, White County! When at the pool or pavilion, please note there is a phone outside the laundry room door for emergency use.

B “B”, “1” or “2” POSTED ON THE GATE: WATER CODES: The number “1” represents side one in the park. This encompasses lots 1 thru 194, which are all on the entrance side of the park. The number “2” represents side two of the park. Which encompasses lots 195 thru 290, which are all the lots over the bridge. The letter “B” represents a Boil Notice for drinking water is in effect. This means, if a “B” with a number is posted on the gate, the lots affected must boil their water prior to use. Notices are posted by the mailboxes, bridge board, laundry room and the breezeway. Also, an e-Blast with information is sent out to all residents who are registered on the PVCOA.com website. See PVCOA website.

Board Members

CLICKERS: Front gate remotes are sold to lot owners. See the treasurer or send an email to pvcoa2012@yahoo.com to obtain one.



CONSERVING IN THE PARK:

Please remember to turn off the lights in the pavilion, rest rooms, and laundry and to close down the umbrellas at the pool and put them in the ladies' and men's room. This will extend their life for future years.

Straighten chairs in the pavilion, breezeway, pool. Treat the park like you would your own home, because it is! Remember the expenses incurred to repair, replace or fix these issues come from your pocket.



CONSTRUCTION/LOT IMPROVEMENT:

Before starting a project on a lot, check with the architectural committee to see if a permit is needed. This includes painting, awnings, adding a shed, decks, etc.



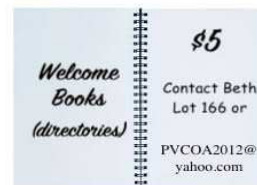
CREEK CARE: Georgia DNR

(Department of Natural Resources) prohibits any and all changes made to the creeks and streams. Trees or vegetation cannot be removed from the side of the creek. This means that moving rocks or natural vegetation and dumping debris of any kind into the waterways are illegal. Please be aware the county has issued fines for these violations in the past.



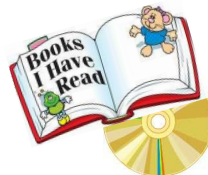
DELIVERIES: UPS and FedEx deliver packages to the sales office - the building on the right side at the entrance (with the mailbox in front). So check for

GARBAGE/TRASH: Only household garbage may be taken to the dumpsters by the mailboxes. All boxes must be flattened to save space. Be mindful of trash bags placed on top of your car for drop-off when leaving. Forgotten, they fall off over the park roads or on Paradise Valley Road. All other items are to be put in the **roll-off** by lot 261. Instead, reusable items may be taken to the Community Thrift Store, located on 115 in Cleveland (706-865-0574). Some profits are donated to local charities. PLEASE... do not leave items outside the roll-off. Can't get your item into the roll-off? Ask for help! Alternatively, White County **Recycling** on Hulsey Road accepts paper, corrugated cardboard, aluminum cans and foil, plastics with a 1 or a 2 recycle label and tin cans. Open M&W 9-5, Sat 8-4. Put the right trash in the right place for the good of our park.



GATE PROTOCOL: DO NOT let anyone through the gate you don't know!! It's for everyone's safety!! Check as you enter that the gate goes down behind you so strangers don't roam around our park.



GOLF CARTS: Golf carts are to be operated **only** by a licensed driver 16 years of age or older. Golf carts need to display the owner's lot number.

When driven after dark, they must have headlights and either tail lights or rear reflectors.



ICE, SODA & WATER

are available at the pavilion. Ice is for sale for \$2.00 per bag. The cash box is located to the left

above the freezer...it is an honor system!! Soda & water are available for a donation and are located in the small refrigerator on the left when entering the pavilion. Also the honor system.



LAUNDRY ROOM: Be timely removing clothes from washers and dryers. Be respectful of others' laundry. Place it on the table if you absolutely must use the machine. Clean all filters after use. Be neat and tidy. Put large empty detergent containers outside the door in the garbage bin.



MAILBOXES are available to rent on a first-come, first-served basis.

They do not come with the lot purchased. For availability of a PVC mailbox, see the treasurer. If you do not have a mailbox, your mail cannot be left at the PVC mailbox area. Arrangements must be made with the Cleveland post office to manage the handling of your mail.



MOTORCYCLES are not allowed to ride around the park like a golf cart. They are only allowed egress and ingress to the owner's lot. Please comply with this rule.

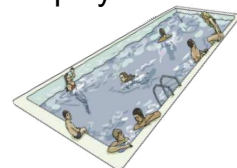


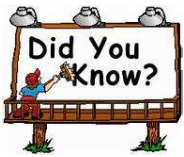
NAME TAGS are for sale for \$10.00 See Beth Wolfe, lot 166, or email her at eawolfe726@gmail.com to obtain one.

PETS: Those of us who have them know only too well how special they are to us. But PLEASE be considerate to all!! No pets are allowed in the pool area or the pavilion. Be sure to carry plastic bags when walking your dog to clean up after them. No dog enclosures, whether temporary or permanent, are allowed to be put up in the park.



POOL: The outdoor shower at the pool is to be used for washing off suntan lotion and perspiration prior to entering the pool, NOT to cleanse your body. The safety rope across the pool is a Georgia State regulation and is NOT to be played on or removed. The pool closes at dusk. Please follow the posted rules and risks.





GENERAL PARK INFORMATION continued



PVCOA website: Owners should register by going to PVCOA.com, go to "Info/Log in" and then click "register". Fill out the form to apply. You can then get the "Pipeline" in living color, receive water & emergency notices via email, get governing docs, and the calendar of events. Also the park's financials, meeting minutes, pictures & so much more are posted there.



QUIET TIME: Quiet time is 11 p.m. to 8 a.m. Using motorized equipment or any loud noises is prohibited between these hours.

RIGHT-OF-WAY: Motor vehicles and RVs have the RIGHT-OF-WAY over golf carts. It's much easier for a golf cart to move off the narrow roads than a larger vehicle! Pull to the side to let the cars and RVs pass.



SEPTIC: Please be very mindful of what you put into the septic system. It is important that you remember not to pour grease or drain cleaner down your drains. No sanitary products or wipes in the toilets. This has caused MAJOR problems in the past that resulted in expensive repairs for which the individual lot owner will be responsible.
